<p>Pink has played an important role in Japanese culture since the eighth-century.</p> <p><i>Baby, The Stars Shine Ensemble, 2009</i></p>	<p>This suit was inspired by Christian Dior’s haute couture 1955 side-swept Oblique Line.</p> <p><i>Kim Jones for Christian Dior Homme suit, spring 2019</i></p>	<p>During the 18th century pink was worn by men as much as by women.</p> <p><i>Man’s suit, France, c. 1785</i></p>	<p>Similar to magenta, the shade known as Mexican pink emerged early in the 20th century.</p> <p><i>Lila Bath, Mexican wedding dress, 1972</i></p>
<p>The bass guitarist for The Clash said that pink is the only true rock ‘n’ roll color.</p> <p><i>Zandra Rhodes dress, “Conceptual Chic” Collection, 1977</i></p>	<p><i>“Pink is the navy blue of India.”</i> -Diana Vreeland</p>	<p>Yves Saint Laurent loved pink, but tended to favor brighter shades.</p> <p><i>Yves Saint Laurent for Christian Dior, dress, 1960</i></p>	<p>Christian Dior often used a soft, warm pink for his evening dresses and perfume packaging.</p> <p><i>Christian Dior, Venus dress, 1949</i></p>
